CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS

May I welcome you all to the 19th Annual General Meeting as we review another very good year for the Naomh Brid and look forward to what lies ahead in 2018 and beyond.

Last year I opened my report with apologising for not being able to say that Musgrave was up and running. Thankfully that problem does not exist this as year, as we are not only the proud tenants of great magnificent changing rooms but also a second pitch will be ready for the New Year.

This of course is not the only great achievement of the year. Again, as usual, there are so many people to thank and it would be very easy to miss people, therefore I will leave it to the individuals reporting after me to give a more detailed go raibh agaibh. However we do need to ensure that we look after this splendid venue and going forward. We need to keep it clean and decorate it etc to show that this is our facility and that we are proud of that.

If we start on the Field of Play – it is great to see that we have been able to continue to develop Camogie and develop the Hurling aspect of the Club. It is wonderful to see our young children with Sliotars in hand on Fun Sunday and hopefully we can build on this.

Well done to all the Hurlers and the new Camogs and to John Duffy, Frank McGurk and Frank MacElhatton and all the others involved for their sterling work.

To the Managers of all Teams from Fun Sunday to Gaelic for Mothers and others to Juvenile Teams – Boys and Girls, to Seniors and Reserves: Thank you very much for all of your commitment and your resilience to continue to look after these Teams throughout the year.

It's never easy to commit yourself to looking after a Team on a regular basis, when you have to deal with cancellations, re-fixtures, exams, holidays and all the other things which can "throw a spanner in the works". But everybody kept going and we were very successful on the field, though we maybe fell at the final hurdle on some occasions.

To be Intermediate Football County Champions, to win the Antrim U16s Football, again for the third year out of four, and to qualify for the Girls Feile once again and win the girls U14 league represents another great year for the club.

Our under-age coaching is thriving and we must acknowledge all involved under Peter Mulgrew and Muiris MacCartaigh for leading this Group along with Martin McCarney, Frank McGurk and the input of so many others. Fun Sunday is the hub of the Club, though we need to improve on how we manage this event every Sunday and ensure that all groups are singing off the same hymn sheet etc. It is therefore vital that we elect a Fun Sunday officer who will lead the charge and bring all these groups together for the benefit of all.

We must congratulate ourselves on still being able to field 2 Teams at different levels – it is always very difficult when you are dealing with Children to get a happy medium between playing Players and giving all the same opportunity, as against trying to win. Although we were very successful at certain levels this year, we have to hold our hands up and say that we didn't follow through on giving everybody the same opportunity and because of this we run the risk of creating elitism between Children at different levels, which will in turn lead to those Children not wanting to participate. It is very difficult to get this right, but it's our responsibility to try, because every Member pays their Membership! We are therefore duty bound to give them the opportunities they are paying for – as I said this is difficult but is something



we need to address as we may not have got this right in 2017.

This is great for the Club but let's build on this, so again, may I thank the Coaches, and being wary not to mention some in particular over others. May I especially thank Eunan Conway and Sean Carter for looking after the Senior Team and leading our players to win the Fr Fitzpatrick Cup.

I would also thank anybody who helped in driving our Children to Matches and Tournaments and also helping with Social Events and organising Tournaments.

Going forward we need to also develop our Coaches in these areas and this will be one of the aims in 2018. This has to be seen as the priority within the Club at all levels and codes.

In 2017 we did set ourselves certain goals and I think we could safely say that we have surpassed ourselves on some of them.

At the start of the year we agreed to improve our Child Protection strategy and thanks to Deirdre Webb and Anne O'Hagan we now have a more comprehensive Child Protection Policy. To help us do this we have devised our own process to handling disputes, complaint and safeguarding issues and thank you to all involved in this.

This, I have to say, was tested on occasions throughout 2017, but we did not fail to provide our Members with a process which could be followed through on.

The fact that we trained an additional 37 members on Safeguarding last month is a huge statement and now we must harness this enthusiasm and willingness to be a volunteer. We must ensure we are compliant with all the necessary safeguarding requirements.

2017 also saw Tracy Galvin continuing to promote Scor within the Club and we host the Antrim Scor on the 19th, so all credit to Tracy and good luck to our acts who will be representing Naomh Brid .

Another great Event again was our La na gClubanna which was again was organised by Tracy, Muiris and Peter and well done to everybody else involved.

Another aspect which we endeavoured to broach this year was the Club Development Plan and this is now in place and there for all to see. However, there is no use having gone to effort. This is a document which is there as a reference point to guide us forward and should be used as such.

May I thank our Sponsors, McGrady Insurance, for their continued participation, Ryan Daly for sponsoring the defibrillator, and Cedar Grove Veterinary Clinic, our most recent shirt sponsor.

Can I thank Harlequins again for their continued support, and as we move forward we need to be aware as to what our needs are there and use it to the best we can.

May I acknowledge the fact that we have 6 young men who are participating in the Dermot Early programme and this is a great statement from these members. They are John Morgan, Cormac Barr, Thomas McCarney, Daniel Foster, John Higgins and Peter Heaney.

Now turning to our Committee, thank you for all your efforts in 2017.

To Phil Convery, for his constant calm and efficient approach to matters, we are indebted and thank you Phil for continuing in this role.

To Marc Murphy and Declan and Marie Canavan— thank you for all your financial guidance and your ability to keep us aware as to the pitfalls of spending too much. We have to agree that last year, complacency crept in after Strictly Brid, though this is something we addressed and the 'money people' kept us on the straight and narrow. This was of course made easier by the Golf Day and Guest Tea which were very successful. For this we must acknowledge Orlaith and Finn McKernan for organising the Guest Tea and Patricia and Peter Lundy for the Golf Day.

From a money perspective, we however cannot become complacent and each team still needs to be self funding. We need to also apply for whatever grants might be available to help fund equipment and coaching needs as we did not do this in 2017.

We also need to apply for Club Maith for accreditation. Our relationship with referees still leaves a lot to be desired and to be put in a very simple manner – Players and Managers

at all levels must remain on sidelines and not get involved in disputes. I'd like to thank our own referees, who take on a difficult role.

Going forward therefore we, as a Club, are in a great position and remember, as I said last year that we are still in our infancy. I have always said that we could only be considered as a "Second Generation Club" as those who were involved at the start all came from different parts of the Province. Our Children are now growing up and need to lead the Club. We can't at any stage be complacent as to who will stay within the Club and who will leave and therefore Inclusivity at all times is vital.

Of course, next year is our twentieth anniversary and we hope to celebrate in style, so watch out for notification on this.

2018 is a new year and hopefully we can build on our successes, cut the corners off the areas which we are not addressing properly and build on something which is truly the envy of many Clubs in the County.

May I again thank all Coaches, Committee, Parents, helpers and most importantly the Players and the Kids within the Club and ask you to commit to building the Club over the next 10 years.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Foreword to Secretary's Report

As the Chairman in his report inevitably looks forward to the future, it's my roll to look back over the last year in the club, and what a year it has been with notable achievements both on and off the pitch.

Once again we can be very proud of what has been achieved this year. After a few years of



leading this report with the successes of our underage sides, it's good to be able to give our senior men the first mention in the review of the year.

The senior men won the Intermediate Championship for the first time since 2006. More of that later. The U14 Girls and the U16 Boys were the stars among our underage teams. The Girls carried all before them winning the Feile and taking the League title with a 100% record. Our U16 Boys also had a fantastic season, winning the South Antrim and All County Championships.

Many of our underage teams also had "nearly" seasons, getting to the latter stages of their competitions or losing key games by the narrowest of margins. However success isn't only measured with silverware. One aspect of our progress as a club that is most admired or envied by rival clubs is the number of young players we have turning out for our teams. The very essence of a GAA club is to get as many Gaels playing our games as possible and this is one area where we continue to excel. We are able to field two boys teams at U12, U14 and U16. Many of our B teams are playing A teams from other clubs and are performing well against them. No other club in Antrim fields two U16 teams. We expect to replicate this at Minor level next year and field a second Minor team for the first time. The numbers attending Fun Sunday continue to grow. Our Summer Camps are also extremely well attended. As the Chairman says in his report, every member is important and these numbers augur very well for the future.

One point illustrates the progress we have made. The senior team that won the Intermediate Championship in 2006 was heavily reliant on players who had begun their playing careers elsewhere. In this year's winning team, all but two of the players have grown up with the club, beginning at Fun

Sunday as children. We should all take a great deal of pride in that achievement.

Our thanks should go to the current group of Fun Sunday coaches and all those who have helped with this group over the years, This really is the foundation upon which the club is built.

Turning to our highlights on the field in a bit more detail, let me begin with the senior men.

The Intermediate championship was won against Dunloy on a memorable Saturday afternoon in October after victories against Tir na nOg, St Endas, and All Saint's, Ballymena, in the earlier rounds. We started the final nervously and trailed by a point at half time. Two points from super sub Ruaridh O'Neill meant the momentum was with us in the second half.

The icing on the cake came from a left footed thunder shot from Ben Leonard who nearly took the net off and his score sealed a victory. The final score of 1:13 to 0:8 flattered Naomh Brid who needed former county player Ronan McGrady to knock over some vital frees to put away a gallant Dunloy side who for 45 minutes were well in the game.

Unfortunately the Ulster Quarter Final against Rostrevor was a game too many for the boys.

The league campaign in Division 2 was less successful. Promotion was the aim, however St. Brigid's finished 5th, 10 points off Glenavy and 7 points off St. Enda's who finished second. An inability to see out games we were in control of, coupled with some unfortunate single point defeats, caused us to fall short in the race for promotion to Div 1.

However the concerted effort from the end of July to the end of October by the senior panel of 33 players was unrivalled in recent years by any adult St. Brigid's team. The future looks



bright with many of the County Minor finalists of 2016 and 2014 progressing on to the senior team.

A huge debt of gratitude is owed to Sean Carter and Eunan Conway, the joint managers, backed up by a support team of Eamon Convery and Dermot Harkin with John Bogue and John Mc Keever always on hand when duty called. The reserve management duo of Mark and Damien all played their part in the successful 2017 season.

The senior reserves had a very promising year culminating in runner up spot in league and a narrow defeat in champion final. Their support was important for the seniors in their run to the intermediate championship.

The U14 Girls had a really great year, winning the Antrim Feile in an epic final against Gort na Mona by 5-01 to 3-06, followed by a guard of honour reception at Musgrave at the Lá na gClubanna. They went on to represent Antrim in the All Ireland Feile in Cavan & Fermanagh.

At the Feile the girls were a credit to themselves, their families, St Brigid's and Antrim – both on and off the field. They lost to the eventual winners San Francisco in the semi Finals. Had it not been for a finger tip save by the San Francisco keeper with the last kick of the game it could have been so different. After beating St Galls, Creggan and Sarsfields in the Antrim championship, the final against St Johns had to be delayed due to the All Ireland Feile and the summer break. When it was eventually played in September the girls were second best to a strong St Johns team which had "helpfully" been bolstered by transferring in two county players from Ardoyne over the summer. In the U14 league the girls also set the standard, lifting the trophy with a 100% win record. Such success doesn't happen by accident and was built on a tough programme of circuits and skills development training stretching back to last

Halloween. This success has been made possible by a group of very dedicated coaches including Noreen Courtney, Ciaran McCann, Stephen Austin, Eamonn Leonard and Niall Mitchell. Add to this a very supportive group of parents that helped to fund raise (especially James Higgins), took girls to matches, etc. A huge thanks to everyone for their ongoing support.

Once again the U16 Boys had a fantastic year. They won the Antrim County Championship beating Sarsfields, St Galls, and St Pauls on the way to winning the South Antrim title (a tense game won by 2 points in extra time) and beating Glenravel 2.12 to 1.06 in the county final.

They lost out to a strong Crossmaglen side in the Ulster quarter final, at the Paul McGirr Tournament where despite a great first half display Cross won a very entertaining game. The lads were obviously disappointed but conducted themselves with dignity and represented the Club honourably. That shouldn't take away from what was a magnificent season again for the U16 boys. Congratulations and thanks must go to Gareth Bradley, John McKenna, Joe Brolly and all involved with the U16 boys for what has been an outstanding year.

But of course at St Brigid's the U16s action doesn't stop with the A team. We are fortunate to have enough boys at this age group that we can field two U16 teams, the only club in the county to do so. In the league the boys acquitted themselves very well when you consider they are playing other clubs A teams. We finished a credible second in the league and with a bit more luck in the semi final we could have found ourselves in the B final but that wasn't to be.

This year's Minor squad was a talented group with many distinguishing themselves for the County. Attendance at training though was



very poor. As a result the squad had a frustrating season that did not fulfil their true potential. Thanks to Joe, Gareth, John and everyone involved in with the Minors this year.

The U12 A at times were excellent and vied all season with St Paul's and St Gall's to be the top team in South Antrim. In the end they were edged out by St Pauls finishing second to them in the league and losing to them in the championship, but there was a lot to be proud of in their performances. The U12bs also did well and made the final of their championship but fell at the final hurdle. They were regularly playing other clubs A teams so their mid table finish was very commendable.

During 2017 our U12, U14 and U16 hurlers continued to play in an amalgamated team under the name of Brid Og. Brid OG U12 had a very successful year, qualifying for Division 1 in The S Antrim league and the Nipper Quinn Cup competition on the basis of their wins in the grading league. Unfortunately the team lost to St Paul's in the league final and were beaten by Davitts in the Cup semi final in a game that could have gone either way.

The team finally tasted victory in the Draco Cup floodlight competition - These games were played over 3 weeks and Brid Og went through the tournament unbeaten with a victory over Lamh Dhearg in the Final.

For the U14 hurlers the highlight of the year was in June when the Ulster Council organised Feile was played at Woodlands. The lads played their best hurling of the year with wins against Letterkenny, Killyclogher and Omagh eventually losing by one point in the final against Eoghan Rua, Coleraine.

For the U16 boys playing in South Antrim Division 2, the step up from U14 was a steep learning curve. However they ended the season strongly losing the South Antrim B

Championship final narrowly to Division 1 team Lamh Dearg after extra time. All but one player in the panel is eligible for U16 again next year so the future is bright for this young team.

The ladies U12's have had also a great year! The girls improved match after match throughout 2017, further developing match skills and growing in strength. They benefitted from the same training programme as the U14s. They went through the league campaign losing only 2 games and many of the U12 girls stepped up to help out the U14s throughout the year

It was always going to be difficult for the U16s ladies to emulate last year's double success. The Championship draw brought us face to face with 'A' Division challengers St John's who had been seeded with us in the 'B' competition! Despite our best efforts at Musgrave, we were beaten by a stronger and bigger squad who ultimately went on to win the competition. In the league the girls grew stronger the season went on, but in the end lost out by a single point to Sarsfields in the deciding game. No silverware but the strong foundation this team has built should enable us to compete at minor level next year.

The senior ladies had a difficult year with numbers down due to external transfers and university moves and throughout the season found it difficult to have a settled team due to holidays, exams and other commitments. For the second year running they lost out in the championship to eventual winners St Pauls.

U8 Camogie continued from strength to strength during the year with training on Monday evenings in Musgrave Park and Harlequins. The squad played regular Go Games tournaments both indoors and outdoors, with a phenomenal record of success. For the first time, St Brigid's



successfully hosted an under 8 Camogie tournament.

Under 10 Camogie continued to grow in numbers and the girls participated successfully in a number of tournaments throughout the year.

G4MO continues to go from strength to strength with strong turnouts at training. The club also hosted its first G4MO tournament in May with 10 teams from Antrim and Down taking part. Moreover the ladies continue to make a huge and important contribution to other activities within the club. The ladies also took part in a number of blitzes across the country including the Ulster and All Ireland blitzes.

It's important to appreciate that we have seen a lot of positive aspects to Fun Sunday (FS) in recent years and 2017 has been no different. We have more players participating, new coaches stepping forward and are making progress in developing hurling and camogie. At times we need to stand back and just look at our pitches on Sunday lunchtime and appreciate and take satisfaction from the fact that we have close to 200 children playing and enjoying football, hurling and camogie.

But success also brings challenges. There is pressure on playing space, a weekly free for all for goalposts, and in recent weeks getting a good spot on a Sunday morning has come down to who gets there first!

We need to get back to a more co-ordinated approach across the whole of FS. We must remember that lots of our parents have more than one child involved and it can be confusing if for example there is no uniformity about when the year finishes. Anything that departs from consistency is not good.

Not having had a Fun Sunday Officer (FSO) for this year has been unfortunate and it is imperative that we get back to having that roll filled ASAP. Once policies and plans right down to the layout of who plays where on a

Sunday has been agreed, we should see a smoother running of FS. Developing and resourcing Fun Sunday will be a priority for the club in the coming year. This year all the Fun Sunday groups have played in a number of Blitzes, challenge games and tournaments throughout the year, and have acquitted themselves well in all of them. The highlight of the year was our own U10 Tournament in September. On the field our teams were superb. We entered three teams, 2 from P7 and 1 from P6 and came away with 2 trophies. It was great to see so many players line out in Naomh Brid colours and a notable mention must go to 3 of our U10 girls who joined with the boys on that day (as they did on a few other occasions through the year) and were exceptional.

The Club set a target recently to aim to have all coaches trained in child protection and safeguarding, Access NI cleared and Level One coaching trained. The safeguarding of our young players is of paramount importance to the club and it was fantastic to see such a huge turnout at our recent child protection course. There were over 40 coaches present, many from within the ranks of our Fun Sunday group.

The evening was hosted by County Antrim officers and they were delighted with the turnout and said that it was by far the biggest crowd from a single club that they had seen.

There were a number of notable achievements in the local schools this year. 2017 proved to be an extremely successful year for Gaelic games in St Brides. Both our boy's and girl's teams were winners of their leagues. Both teams competed in the top section of the Belfast Leagues. The girls were unbeaten in the league and won their championship. Our boy's reached the Raffo Cup final for the third time in three years but lost out to a talented St. John the Baptist side. This was the only game the boy's lost all year. The defeat in the final was redeemed when



they claimed the South Belfast Schools trophy at the Bredagh Blitz in June. With an average of 36 boys attending training we were able to field three teams throughout the year. Hurling and Camogie continue their upward development in the school too.

At Victoria College we regularly have 25 players playing football and hurling. The highlight of the year was the success of the year 9/10 footballers who reached the final of the Ulster Year 9/10 competition . There were 4 St Brigid's girls on that Victoria team. The majority of the girls playing GAA at the school are attached to other clubs across the city giving us limited recruitment opportunities. Stranmillis has great recruitment possibilities but progress with this school has stalled over the last couple of years and needs a number of people involved (at least initially) to avail of the opportunity in this area. The club must look at this seriously as quickly as possible.

The Summer Cul Camps were once again a great success. We held three summer camps over the summer, with over 200 children passing through the gates of Harlequins for coaching in both football and hurling and lot of fun!

St Brigid's again continue hosting some of the largest coaching events in the county for the primary school section of the club. The camps were excellently organised by club members, again this year it was also great to see a sizable number of the Naomh Brid juveniles helping out at the camps, a number of senior players made themselves available to help throughout the summer. Without the help of these club members these camps could not have taken place.

Off the field this year, a few important achievements stand out.

The opening of the new club rooms and the addition of a second full size pitch will give us the potential to move the club to the next level. The changing rooms have already made

a huge difference. The second pitch came into play a little late this year to make a big impact but I am certain we will see the benefit of it immediately in 2018. However we cannot afford to be complacent, and we should continue to look at what our requirements will be as we grow as a club over the next 20 years.

St. Brigid's hosted the 2017 Scór na nÓg Antrim final and was without a doubt the best County Scór Final that Antrim has seen in many years . The standard in every category was so high and the young people performed to such a high standard . The event was a huge success and St. Brigid's showcased its wonderful support for culture within the club. This would not have been possible without the many volunteers on the day, from all sectors of the club, players and non-players, young and old. None of this would have happened without the tireless efforts of Tracy Galvin who took on the organisation of the event, and our thanks go to her for all her hard work.

The Club Day or La na gClubanna in May was a great success for the second year running. Held at Musgrave for the first time, it was wonderful to see so many participants, young and not so young, all enjoying the exhibition matches, stalls and activities. Everyone enjoyed the day, and I think it was a significant step in building a strong sense of club identity.

I would also like to acknowledge the assistance of Paul Campbell and Oliver Lennon in providing facilities to play our games and the constant work done by Oliver Lennon to maintain such an active, informative and positive social media presence.

Thank you also to Marc Murphy who, as our main liaison with Harlequins, has helped to ensure that our relationship with the Rugby club here is as smooth as possible. A mention must also go to Martin McCarney who does vital work throughout the year to ensure that



our membership database is accurate and that we have all our players registered, insured and paid up.

Thank you also to all the other members of the Club Committee who help with the day to day running of the club and our planning for the future.

A special mention also to Frank McGurk who received recognition this year as "Irish News Club Volunteer of the Year" for his tireless work behind the scenes at the club and in particular his work in promoting hurling and his coaching with our local schools. People like Frank are the lifeblood of the GAA and it is very pleasing to see this recognised in this way.

I have mentioned some names in the team reports which follow, however it's impossible to mention everyone by name. I want to end by recognising the commitment, dedication and skill of all the many coaches and helpers who give up their time to work with the teams. The club would not achieve the success or growth that it does, without all your efforts and on behalf of St Brigid's I want to thank every one of you.

Good luck to all our players, coaches and members in 2018. Naomh Brid Abu!

SENIOR MEN'S FOOTBALL



St Brigid's have a rare blend of experienced senior players and talented young players of 19 and 20 that with the right dedicated effort could land a much sought after intermediate championship title in 2017.

Despite the departure to foreign shores of Canada for Duncan McAuley, the more exotic Kilcoo for Dermot McLaughlin and the loss of Nial Lundy who transferred to England where he is studying. The Club welcomed back a few old hands in Ruaridh O'Neill and Kevin Gallagher, both were instrumental in landing a much sought after cup.

However the usual slow pace to preseason followed in January and February. A mixture of pre-season strength and conditioning and park runs were all ignored as was the Ulster league in terms of serious pre-season effort and the predictable price was paid in early league points. In the Ulster league we played four games winning two and losing in two narrowly missing out on qualifying for the quarter finals. It gave a chance to some old hands and some new ones to see how they liked the thought of furthering their Gaelic careers.

The ACFL Div 2 campaign began with a convincing defeat to the hands of St. Enda's who were much better prepared for the season than their South Belfast hosts. The absence of Enda Clarke was sorely missed in that first game as we were cleaned out to say the least in midfield and harsh lessons were learned for later on in the year. A loss of 2:16 to 1:9 meant there was much too improve upon.



Easy victories away to Davitts and Antrim helped put a smile on the senior panel's faces. Moneyglass were the subject of a facile 20 point victory at Musgrave. Next up was an away trip to Glenavy. Where the usual failings of the first half of the season came to light, the inability to see off a game we were in control of. This was not helped by the loss of keeper Dean Smith to a broken bone. A convincing win at home to Tir na nOg on Sunday 28th May helped keep the thoughts of promotion a possibility, and a comfortable win over Rasharkin at Musgrave kept things ticking over. Despite being quite a few players short a 5 point win was secured over Gort Na Mona. However the home game to Dunloy once again showed the inability to see out a game. This important art of game management was one which was slow to pick up as a draw was snatched from the jaws of victory in this topsy /turvey game.

Old foes All Saints were next on the menu and after scoring 5 goals 2 league points were in the bag. A facile victory over Ardoyne finished off the first half of the season.

The second phase meant a host of away games and first up was Rasharkin. This away game was lost again by poor game management by a point and signalled the real end of any hopes of winning the league, any thoughts of getting promotion were scuppered by another single point defeat to Moneyglass, and a home defeat to Glenavy. The away trip to Tir na nOg a week ahead of our preliminary championship game was a cagey affair with another defeat for the visiting Malone Roaders.

The game away to St. Enda's was similar as both teams would meet later in the championship a week later again, with St. Enda's keen for the points to secure promotion they did cut through St. Brigid's easily. However both teams would meet shortly in the quarter final of the championship.

The league table does not lie and St. Brigid's finished 5th, 10 points off Glenavy and 7 points off St. Enda's who finished second. The inability to close out close games and the poor away record all took their toll.

From a lucky preliminary round break to a convincing win in the county final

Glenavy hosted the game v Tir na nOg Randalstown on the 20 August. Three good weeks of preparations had meant that hopes were high going into this game. A challenge game away to Madden in Armagh, when some of our young travellers rushed from the airport to attend the game signalled to the panel we had found a system and quality to mount a challenge for the much sought after trophy. However our opponents had beaten us quite often over recent times and we were right to be wary of the south west men. The game itself was one which Randalstown took charge of after a first half goal and had their noses in front right into the final minutes of the second half when Peter Webb had a shot dip under the bar and through the hands of the Tir na nOg keeper. St Brigid's tagged on another point to seal a lucky win. A fortnight later St. Enda's were the fancied team at Hanastown in the next round. This time St Brigid's swept into an 8 point lead taking the newly promoted Glengormley men by surprise. A much improved game management set up ensured the Biddies could



withstand a spirited fight back to hold out by 2 points.

A top class opening 40 minutes and great displays from Patrick Finegan, Conor King, Finn McKernan, Cathal Conway, Enda Clarke, Peter Webb, John Blaney, James Smith and Jack Dowling meant the semi-final was approached with confidence.

The semi-final clash v All Saint's, Ballymena on Sat. 23 Sept at Corrigan Park saw a brace of goals from John Blaney and a solid team display when the panel's strength was needed as the Finegan twins had departed for New Zealand and Peter Lundy for Canada from the previous round. Older Finegan brother Rory came into the side and veteran Ruairidh O'Neill helped steer the team to victory, on a scoreline of 4:9 to 0:11. Fellow veteran Stephen Morrissey made 3 good saves at Corrigan a feat he would repeat v Dunloy in the final. "Shoukri" played in the first round in 2006 v Dunloy at Ballymena when they won their opening game in their last winning Intermediate campaign in Antrim.

Preparations continued for the final at Aghohill on Sat. 14 Oct. Dunloy were playing in their 3rd final in a row at this level. The North Antrim dual club had defeated St. Brigid's in the 2016 county minor final and quite a few from both teams had made the step up to senior. A nervous start by Naomh Brid meant Stevie Morrissey was called into action all too often in the first half but a couple of late first half points saw the Malone boys trail by a single point going into the second half. After getting on level terms substitute Ruairidh O'Neill scored 2 from play and assisted with another point and the momentum was going the Biddies way. The icing on the cake came from a left footed thunder shot from Ben Leonard who had been playing really well in training and his score sealed a victory. The final score of 1:13 to 0:8 flattered Naomh Brid who needed former county player Ronan McGrady to knock over some vital frees to put

away a gallant Dunloy side who for 45 minutes were well in the game.

The launch pad for much of the seasons success was the midfield duo of Cathal Conway and big Enda and again they dominated their men with John Blaney fleet footed for breaking ball, and possession won time and time again to break Dunloy's hearts for a 3rd season.

The draw for the Ulster Championship saw Down Champions Rostrevor travel to Corrigan to play St. Brigid's who failed to convert 3 early chances that fell just below the crossbar and then went on to concede a sloppy early goal, that meant the red and blacks went in at half time 1:7 to 0:5 in front. Despite Enda Clarke dominating Midfield and Ronan McGrady scoring 4 points from frees we simply could not get enough scores from play as James Smith and Ronan McGrady scored 2 each.

The concerted effort from the end of July to the end of October by the senior panel of 33 players was unrivalled in recent years by any adult St. Brigid's team. The future looks bright with many of the County Minor finalists of 2016 and 2014 progressing on to the senior team. It was particularly pleasing to see Michael Cummings transition from a substitute on the 2014 minor team to a senior stalwart within 3 years. The determined effort to blood younger players paid a rich dividend, in 2017. Issues for the club in 2018 at Adult level is keeping the tight bond that now exists with so many players in Dublin, England and Scotland. Our second Intermediate championship was won with all but 2 of the team graduating from Fun Sunday right through to club minor finals before playing at adult level.

A huge debt of gratitude is owed to Sean Carter and Eunan Conway. joint managers. Sean combined a busy work schedule around

P3 & P4 & P5 (boys & Girls)

In January 2017 the coaching group of the P3/4 boys' football made a concerted effort to improve the participation levels, attendance and structure of this area of the club. We took over a group of 20 boys with great potential but where participation at matches was very low and attendance in the group was sporadic outside of a core group of regulars. It was decided that effective communications with parents was the key to growing the group and therefore we set about building a new database for the group that included coordinating all training and match notifications. Parents were provided with a schedule of events several times within the year; allowing them to forward plan and avoid clashes with other commitments. In addition to this we worked with the club's schools officer to do a leaflet drop in the local schools targeted at growing the P3 age group. The net result of this work is that the number of boys regularly attending Fun Sunday within the group has doubled over the year. We have added over 20 new boys to the P3/4 group and several boys, who had previously left, have returned to the club. In September 2017 we widened the administration of the group to include the new P3s and have subsequently increased the numbers in this age group by a third in the first three months. Overall, we now have over 70 boys registered

to play in the P3/4 and P5 groups with over 45 regularly attending matches & training. On the coaching side we have doubled the number of coaches in the group through maximising the participation of parents. We have introduced structured training sessions concentrating on core skills. We looked to increase the number of matches the boys were playing by moving away from the Saturday morning Go Games and replacing them with challenge matches with a wide range of clubs. We were able to use the contacts of our coaches to provide the boys with special skills sessions from guest GAA stars like Tony Kernan (Armagh) and Conleith Gilligan (Derry). Consequently, the boys have had over 40 outings this year between Fun Sunday, challenge matches, tournaments, and guest coaching sessions.

The highlights of the year were strong showings at the An Ríocht and Bellaghy U8 tournaments. We rounded off the year with a day trip to Limavady Wolfhounds GAC where the group performed well in a range of great games and enjoyed a fun day of activities laid on by our hosts. The trip was rounded off by a prize giving ceremony for all the boys. As the year closes we are in a much stronger shape for moving ahead. A big thank you must go out to Charlie O'Neill and all our coaches and parents, for what has been a great collaborative effort throughout the year.

STBRIDE'S PRIMARY SCHOOL

January-June 2017 proved to be an extremely successful year for Gaelic games within the school. Both our boy's and girl's teams entered 2017 as winners of their leagues. Both teams competed in the A section of the Belfast Leagues. The league sections run from A through to E.

The girls continued a blistering start to the year by collecting the Championship after defeating John the Baptist in the final.

This saw the girls complete their league and championship fixtures for the season unbeaten. With between twenty and thirty girls lining out at training each Monday the season was a resounding success.

Our boy's reached the Raffo Cup final for the third time in three years and lost out to a talented St. John the Baptist side.

This was the only game the boy's lost all year. The defeat in the final was redeemed when they claimed the South Belfast Schools trophy at the Bredagh Blitz in June..

With an average of 36 boys attending training we were able to field three teams throughout the year. Our B team competed valiantly in the Carragher Cup, winning two out of four games. We entered a Primary 6 side into the annual Aquinas Cup and lost in the final to St. Joseph's Carryduff. Despite a weakened team, the P6s showed wonderful spirit and talent. Under the tutelage of Frank McGurk and Frank McElhatton and Pat O'Hagan, after school hurling and camogie began each Wednesday. This enabled us to enter the hurling championship, alongside the camogie league and championships. Our camogie team had a solid start to their league campaign, finishing second out of a group of four. The championship saw the camogie team top their

group and lose out narrowly in the semi final to Christ the Redeemer. The hurlers turned in valiant displays in their championship groups, just missing out.

September-December The new academic year saw an average turnout of forty at boy's Gaelic training and twenty five at girls training. Both teams have had an outstanding start to the new campaign, with the boys' and girls' retaining their league titles.

The girls' produced a series of tremendous wins before beating St. John the Baptist in an outstanding encounter. Following a five point deficit at half time, the girls turned in an amazing display of determination to claim victory.
